About the Project

Cinnabar Vista filmed "My Dad's Dentist Story" for the First Nations Health Authority to headline their Cultural Safety & Humility session at the Pacific Dental Conference.

Besides the B-roll captured around Vancouver Island, the DP/Director (Jeremiah Patton) captured every scene in Nanaimo BC, Canada, all in one day.

Dramatically, with all the rain and the tight schedule, the RED camera's main monitor began to fail by the end of the end. By the time half of the image went black (due to water damage) the light was falling so the final few scenes by the river were filmed with only half an image visible!

Connie Paul, the story's writer and presenter, was an inspiration, willing to explore hills and bushed, in the rain, all to do justice to her dad's amazing and powerful story.

During the first half of the 20th Century many Aboriginal youth in Canada were forced into 'Indian' Residential Schools. While some people going through extreme hardship are weakened—others discover new strength within themselves. This true, practically unbelievable story is recounted by the daughter of a survivor of the Kuper Island Indian Residential School in British Columbia. She shares with us the lessons her father taught her about rejecting pity, learning to be strong, and making your own luck despite the adversity of life.
